
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DIRECTOR'S PEN

VISION:



- Environmental promotion and innovative approach to development



Again for drinking water facility through Solar System at Thannapalli VSS, for excavation of tubewell at Saliapalli VSS, for Goattary house at Kariamba VSS, for construction of overhead tank for water supply at Karadapalli VSS and for construction of culverts at Raghunathpur, Mahasingipalli and Bellapunji VSS.

The demonstration and cultivation of sunflower in the nehalapalli and metajhari also facilitate convergence program through Horticulture Department for Sunflower cultivation taught people a lot. Fishery and ARD Department for animal vaccination camp at Thanapalli,



ECRICC:

Project Coverage

LIPICA is playing the role of facilitated NGO in Ganjam District of Bahuda Landscape for driving both environmental restoration and social transformation. Bahuda estuary is situated at the extreme south coast of Odisha, in Ganjam district covers an area of 15 sq. km with an average depth of 2.6 meter. It covers two Blocks namely Rangailunda and Chikiti, expanding to 25 Gramapanchayats and 81 villages. The Enhancing Climate Resilience of India's Coastal Communities (ECRICC) project is transformative coastal adaptation initiative addressing these pressing issues. Supported by the Green Climate Fund (GCF), Ministry of Environment, Forest, and Climate Change (MoEFCC) and the Forest, Environment climate Change (FE&CC) Department Government of Odisha and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) That aims to enhance the resilience of the lives and livelihoods of the most vulnerable populations particularly women, in the coastal areas of India, to climate change and extreme events, using an ecosystem-centred and community-based approach to climate adaptation.

Key Activities

1. Coastal Ecosystems Restoration - Empowering local communities to conserve and restore mangroves, sea grass, saltmarshes for resilient ecosystems. FNGO LIPICA taking the bold steps for

planting of 10 ha. of mangroves plantation to protect the coastal eco systems in Patisunapur area under Sunapur Grampanchayat of Chikiti Block of Ganjam District.. Organisation is taking key initiatives and empowering the community to preserve their ecological integrity and bolster coastal resilience.

2. Climate – Adaptive Livelihoods

System of Rice Intensification – Rice farming is the life blood of India’s coastal communities, yet climate change – with erratic rain, soaring temperatures and soil degradation – places traditional practices of farming at risk. The system of Rice Intensification (SRI) offers a transformative solution empowering 1350 farmers to achieve higher yields using less resources while reducing water usage to minimise methane gas emission to Green House Gas (GHG). Farmers have been provided with technical training and hand holding support by FNGO teams and climate Champions during implementation of SRI..

Crab Farming – Mud crab farming aligns with climate adaptation goals while generating tangible social and economic returns for coastal communities. Five nos of farmers of Sunapur village of Chikiti Block raising mud crabs (Scylla Serrate) in controlled ponds instead of wild catch through overfishing, local secure steady earning while



allowing marine life to replenish. This delicate balance between people and nature makes crab culture a game –changer. The project received technical support from the marine Products Export Development Authority (MPEDA) with Rajiv Gandhi Centre for Aquaculture (RGCA). In the pilot phase it is good learning to all and each crab famers getting benefited 20% of profit Rs.30,000 to 40,000 after their total investment.

Ornamental Fisheries – Fresh water ornamental fish farming offers a sustainable alternative providing steady income while reducing dependence on open sea fishing. This initiatives enhances coastal resilience, offering a low risk, high –reward livelihood opportunity that strengthens both communities and environment. The project is supported three nos of farmer’s covers 03 villages of Bahuda Landscape. This is the pilot demonstration for both forward and backward linkage.



3. Strengthened Coastal Governance and Institution -ECRICC project is strengthening governance and institutional mechanisms to build long term resilience .Institutionalising local governance structures, community participation and capacity building initiatives the project ensures sustainable development and climate change.

DCW (Deaf Child World Wide):

From 2021 we are working with disable person for their mainstreaming and development with dignity as well as improvement in condition of livelihood and rehabilitation. From 2013 we work with the Deaf Children (DCs). The objectives of this program is to enhance access to Inclusive Pre-Primary and Primary Education and all round development of the deaf children in Digaphandi and Patrapur block of Ganjam District with the support of DCW, UK. Different stake holders are involved in this program like parents of the DCs, Community people, AWWs, ASHA workers, School teachers, peers of DCs and officers of Line Departments. In this context our team organizing different activities like Awareness on the causes of Deafness, Issues of DCs and need for their development, Rights of Deaf Children, Development of communication through Sign Language, Training on Safeguarding the interest of DC and Child Protection, FLC support to DCs and Study Camp for DCs and Preparation of Adopted Educational Material etc. Home based education support has been provided to



44 Deaf Children of Primary level and 2 Deaf Children of Pre- Primary level. the home of the DC on regular

basis. TOD has been providing support to CBRW and DRM as per need. Home based education support has been given to DCs and also paid random field visit to have a close eye on the activities. In School Examinations they had given better performance like general children and integral communication skill establish by DCs in community and school.


FUN AND LEARNING CENTRE (FLC)

There are five Fun and Learning Centre (FLC) are running well in our Project Area at Bhismagiri, Nandagaon, Pendurabadi and Dankari in Digaphandi Block and Bomakei in Patrapur Block. These FLCs are being managed by the FLC facilitators and community people had taken the charge for regular monitoring of the same safeguard. In this Centers DC are facilitated to get education along with their peers and to enhance their competency on the different subjects by local instructor. The strategy is for sustainable process at community.



PARENT'S WORK SHOP

For improvement of the competency of the DC in their education the support of the parents is highly essential. So, Parent's sensitization and right of entitlement conducted meeting workshop and trainings on the different issues related to DC, facilitate to train them to develop



resource materials.

STUDY CAMP

LIPICA had organized Intensive Study Camp for the Deaf Children from 27th to 30th of June-2024 for the DC of 1st to 4th standard, from 6th to 9th July-2024 for the DC of 5th to 8th standard at LIPICA Training Centre at Ambapua in Berhampur. In these two camps thirty nine Deaf Children and twenty peers had attended and got the opportunity of reading, writing and to participate in diifferent events, competitions, cultural Programs. Further



they were facilitated to visit different public institutions like Post Office, Medical, Police Stations and also to visit and enjoy Car Festival in

Berhampur. The Parents and peers of the DC were facilitated with the knowledge about the process of teaching of DC through adapted Teaching Learning Materials. Children forum initiated for future integrated.

The integrated tribal development program in Tumba tribal area and Baibali project coordinate by program manager is not sufficient support fund to the community. The community worker communicated the women members on farmer expertise on Pattern agriculture and project coordinator explained tricultural development through agriculture motivated and planned for next agriculture session. Bio manuring, Bio pesticide preparation organized and explained in detailed on line showing cultivation of paddy and its outcome. The adolescence girls health and use of green vegetable at family accessibility objective also discussed. LIPICA will take care of this intervention for the group as one of the core value of LIPICA. HIV/AIDS day celebrated in both the project and impact with migration issue create social problems i.e 40% families of the area. Mother of the family take all the risk for children and old age person for long 6 months. LIPICA. The old case studies discussed.
